Ropsley & District WI - Poppy cascade



Like many other WIs, Ropsley & District WI are always keen to do things for their community. Through Covid we have delivered food parcels to the elderly and isolated, made scrubs and scrub bags, organised the village 'front doorstep' VE Day celebrations, organised collections for the two local Women's Refuges and for the local FoodBank, set up a Living Advent Calendar, and organised, got funding and nominations for, packed and delivered Community Christmas Gifts to those who had helped and supported the community through the pandemic or to those who just needed something to smile about after a very difficult year.

In the spring of 2021, Ropsley & District WI decided that it would be

lovely to have a Poppy Cascade at St Peter's Church for Remembrance in November. A quick internet search brought the realisation that this was a big task for a village of 800 or so people. One village of 15,000 residents managed 5000 poppies which was great for its cascade but at that rate we wouldn't even have 300 poppies. We realised that we were going to have to start making poppies much earlier in the year if we were to have sufficient poppies even for a small cascade so the call went out in May 2021 for people to knit or crochet poppies.

Throughout the year, WI Members and villagers from people all around Ropsley and the surrounding villages were knitting and crocheting. Families and friends joined in when they heard about it and there was even one lady from Nottingham who stopped at The Green Man for lunch, saw a notice asking for volunteers and went home, knitted poppies, and





posted them to us. The response was amazing and over the months, the number of poppies crept up and up until, by the time assembly began in mid-October we had amassed an amazing 4,127 poppies. A fantastic effort by everyone involved. Meanwhile, a framework had been built and the next stage was to attach poppies to it and to the nets which would run over the ground. With no real idea of how long it would take to add the poppies or how many volunteers would appear, assembly started on a dark wet Wednesday in mid-October in the aisles of St Peter's. The initial idea of working from 10-12 on Wednesday and Thursday quickly went

out of the window and it eventually took 22 hours of group effort until the last poppy was attached early on Saturday afternoon. It was



a real pleasure to leave the church with the pews blanketed in poppies ready for the installation on 30 October.



A morning rainstorm delayed the installation until the afternoon but the sun came out as the cascade went up against the church porch and 6 months' work came to fruition in a beautiful poppy cascade which pools out across the grass.

It isn't all about blood!

Lincolnshire Emergency Blood Bikes Service (LEBBS) is often supported by donations from WIs. Barrowby WI is one of those which is amazed by the fantastic work done by the volunteers. The Chairman and Secretary, who are Barrowby residents, gave an interesting and eye-opening presentation at our September meeting.

Blood Bikes aims to replace expensive alternatives for the transport of blood and other products, out of hours. They work to high professional standards and save the NHS tens of thousands of pounds every year. There are 36 regional blood bike groups, with more than 3,300 volunteers. In 2019, those volunteers made more than 100,000 "runs". So, what do they transport? Well, blood, plasma, platelets, factor VIII and blood samples are the more obvious products. They also carry X-rays, medication, equipment, patients' notes and more, but did you know that they transport donor breast milk?

The milk, for premature babies, is moved through a network of processing, storage and hospitals. Milk is collected from the donor and passed in a relay-type system with other blood bike groups to where it can be stored or to where it's needed. For "our" team, the storage facility is in Hull.

LEBBS was formed in January 2012 with a committee of 15 people. The membership comprises 134 riders and drivers, 221 controllers and 10 fundraisers. The riders work out-of-hours (weekends and bank holidays) but this has recently been expanded to midweek, if a rider accepts this. During lockdown, a 24/7 service was provided, with over 500 mid-week and

335 weekend runs. This was more than any single year's total to date. Their coverage area incorporates the second largest county in England, an area of nearly 2,700 square miles and a population of approximately 1.1 million people. They provide services covering Boston and Grantham Hospitals in the South, Lincoln County Hospital and Scunthorpe, Grimsby and Goole Hospitals in the North. The coverage also includes, but is not limited to, Hull Royal Infirmary and to the regional NHS Blood and Transplant Centre in Sheffield.

For every 'out of hours' shift there is a team of volunteers ready to respond at a moment's notice. When a medical item needs urgently transporting, the hospital places a call to the controller via a centralised number. The controller then liaises with the nearest rider or driver who makes the collection, and delivers it quickly and safely to its destination. The teams work on a rota basis, with a charity-owned vehicle located at the rider's or driver's house for the duration of their shift. This means that whatever the time, day or night, they are able to respond as quickly as possible.

The charity needs to raise £1,000 per vehicle per year – that's £14,000, as they have 10 bikes, plus four cars and a van (for shows and recovery). The types of service provided are continually evolving, including work with Lincs & Notts Air Ambulance, to ensure that they have a supply of blood. Riders must be more than 25 years old, have an advanced riding qualification and must be re-tested every three years. Not surprisingly, more volunteers are always welcome.

CLIMATE AMBASSADORS

Climate Change & COP26

We see and hear daily, the news, documentaries and reports of the now-accepted impacts which climate change is wreaking on the planet; ocean level rises, glacier retreat (eg Hindu Kush, Pakistan), increasing forest fires(California, Australia) and so on. This seems far removed from us... but is it? The increased flooding in the UK and Europe is our local experience of climate change – and we should understand that we all need to tackle the climate and biodiversity crisis as the planet is just one, big, interconnected and enmeshed system – it's not just "in your backyard", all our "backyards" are connected.

COP26 aimed to:

- secure global net zero by mid-century and keep 1.5 degrees within reach
- adapt to protect communities and natural habitats
- mobilise the finance needed
- work together to deliver (globally)

Phew! No wonder climate change is described as a super-wicked problem! As I write on this final day of COP26 (Friday 12/11), and we look at the list of boards, panels, company alliances and government "coalitions" announced this week, to tackle various aspects of the crisis, it seems mind-boggling. But

that *is* what it is going to take; governments indicating what finance and laws will be employed and then business will feel confident to invest in the new technologies needed. And importantly, some "bodies" to drive the agenda forward and also hold countries to account.

COP26 progress (in the process):

The Breakthrough Agenda launched at the World Leaders Summit commits countries to work together to make clean technologies and sustainable solutions the most affordable, accessible and attractive option in each emitting sector(e.g travel, manufacture) globally before 2030. The 'Glasgow Breakthroughs' are a first set of global goals in high emitting sectors underneath this agenda. (Better short-term targets we hope)

- In 2022, as COP President, the UK will take forward four key priorities and seeks to remain as the co-ordinating force to oversee the 'Global Checkpoint Process' and will report on the State of the Transition. Annual reporting by countries required.
- Leaders have invited the International Energy Agency, working in collaboration with IRENA, the United Nations High Level Climate Action Champions, and other institutions as appropriate to assess progress against goals (Good we need policemen!)
- The UK states "our ambition is to sustain and continually strengthen international cooperative action in high emitting sectors" (maybe Mr Alok Sharma has a job for life!)

COP26 progress (in technical/financials):

- The Global Methane Pledge hopes to reduce this potent GHG by 30% by 2030
- £200 million for the Lowering Emissions by Accelerating Forest Finance (LEAF) Coalition to protect tropical forests.
- Zero Emission vehicle transition council recently set up to speed transition as 10% of GHG globally are from vehicles (and rising faster than any other sector)
- New commitments for climate financing also came from the United Kingdom, Spain, and others to deliver the \$100 billion per year to developing countries.
- Partnerships with five 'pioneer countries' Bangladesh, Fiji, Jamaica, Rwanda and Uganda to support them and their local communities to get the finance they need for their climate plans

These are a flavour of the resolutions but there are just too many to mention – for further details

But what can we do? We can still play our part by staying informed, adapting when we can e.g. ZEV cars, new home heat sources - bearing in mind the financial costs and taking advantage of new tech subsidies – and encouraging other individuals and business to do the same.

It is easy to feel cynical and hopeless, in the face of some of the actions or lack of action that we see around us on an everyday basis, and with yet another UN conference such as COP26 coming along, attendees jetting in and the accompanying media circus. However, if we cast our minds back 10 years or so, we should realise that we are not stuck in the climate-change-denying, "business-as-usual" mode of the 2000's and that progress is being made. We just need to keep the pressure on!

For an optimistic and heartening look at where the latest innovations are helping our planet, do try and catch "The Earthshot Prize", championed by Prince William; on BBC iPlayer. It really is amazing what we humans can do if we put our minds to it!
