December offers a host of online courses including:

Felicity's Advent Dotting Peg

Make a beautiful Scandinavian inspired heart decoration which will use Felicity's popular dotting technique to decorate it. Add a peg and you can display Christmas cards or use it as a Christmas Countdown (a kind of reverse advent calendar).

Watercolour painting with Kendrick – snowy holly

Our new project looks at using a seasonal image as our inspiration, in this case Holly which has been lightly dusted with Snow. We are aiming to develop an understanding of using the white of the paper to create highlight and develop contrast against the vivid colours of winter. We will be encouraging you to look for your inspiration to develop your understanding of the subject, but you will be able to follow the demonstration at every stage and refer to the imagery provided.

PUBLIC AFFAIRS & EDUCATION

Since our last newsletter we have enjoyed another Ladies Luncheon, this time held at Greetham Valley golf club. However, it takes more than a deluge to deter WI ladies from their lunch date, and we were delighted to welcome 57 members and one non-member.



The team at Greetham Valley did us proud and we enjoyed a delicious lunch in very comfortable surroundings, with excellent service.

Our speaker was former Police Family Liaison Officer (FLO), Dianne Squires, who served as a Police Officer from Feb 1988 until Feb 2018

Having initially served as a uniform officer, Di joined Lincoln CID in 1993 and began training as a Family Liaison Officer (FLO) in 1997. Her first employment as a FLO was Sept 1999 and her last was in 2016 when

she was employed as the FLO to support Luke and Ryan Hart whose mother, Claire and sister, Charlotte, were killed by their father (Claire's husband), Lance. Having outlined briefly the role of the FLO, Di spoke to us with great openness about the challenges she faced during this very traumatic investigation and how, whilst keeping the requisite professional distance, she helped and supported the Hart brothers. This was Di's last case in her role as FLO, and it had clearly left its mark. Her talk was very frank, absolutely fascinating and quite emotional, provoking a number of questions and comments from her audience.

Jackie Jukes (Navenby WI) gave a heartfelt vote of thanks to Di for coming to share her experience with us and presented her with a bouquet of flowers. Di very generously waived any fee in lieu of a donation to the "Love Grace" charity.

Thanks are due to all my fellow Public Affairs Committee members – Shelagh Coates, Steph' Balderson, Jackie Jukes and Sue Lock – for their usual unstinting support and hard work on the day.

CLIMATE AMBASSADORS

Can we have a 'green' Christmas?

Now that's a challenge but we are the WI so, yes, we can certainly try! This is the 'climate corner' so our emphasis is on reducing the environmental impact of the festive season. It is a double win however, as in the current economic climate, we can save money at the same time as being more sustainable; what's not to love?

Gift giving at Christmas is a nice way to say that annual 'thank you' but the shops are full of over packaged, and often overpriced gift sets. Something homemade - fudge, preserves, pickles, woolly hats, houseplant, the list is endless - is much more personal and always welcome. If you aren't 'crafty' or simply don't have the time, then take a look at the many Christmas Fairs held in your local towns and villages; support artisan makers and hobbyists by buying something made with love..

Families come in all shapes and sizes in the modern world and present giving can turn out to be the most stressful and expensive part of the festive season. Have you considered just buying for your 'significant other' and then, as an alternative with the rest of your Christmas Day party people, playing a lucky dip/secret Santa type game? Each person buys and wraps a gift up to a set amount, say £10, suitable for all (so ideally not a bottle of beard oil!) and preferably from a Charity shop. On the day, secretly add to the pile so no one knows who has bought what - part of the fun is the guessing! Names are put in a hat and the first drawn gets to choose the first present. The next person can choose a present or steal the first person's! If the first person is left present-less, they pick another one from the pile..... and so on. It's great fun if there's plenty of stealing and bizarre charity shop finds too!

To wrap your gifts, please avoid buying wrapping paper with foil, glitter or any non-recyclable element to it. You could try using simple and cheap brown wrapping paper, kinder to the environment and to your pocket! And try to reduce reliance on sticky tape – as a soft plastic it just does not degrade. Plastic free twine or string is perfect (it may make wrapping a two-person job but is worth the extra effort!).

Presents can look gorgeous if you spend a few moments decorating them, once wrapped. Just add some festive fun with:

- bought stamps (invest in a pad and a stamp or two from any craft supplier and they will last years).
- potato prints of simple shapes such as holly leaves, stars (remember doing this at school?).
- freestyle artwork if you are skilled and enthusiastic enough.
- bows made from preloved ribbons (the thin ones in tops and jumpers always come in useful.
- dried hedgerow or garden leaves and flowers.

For 'eco' gift tags, simply re-use Christmas cards, cutting out the desired shape with scissors or old pinking shears. To be a little more creative, try cutting oblong brown cardboard tags and glue on motifs from those old cards.





Christmas wouldn't be complete without a little - or a lot of - home decorating, and the tree is often star of the show. Christmas trees come in all shapes and sizes and if your artificial tree continues to give good service as a festive focal point, just keep bringing it down from the loft. However, if you like a real fir tree, do check it is locally grown to reduce the environmental impact of transport, and consider a pot grown tree

especially from the so called discount supermarkets. They can start off quite small but, put them outside after Christmas, repotting every couple of years, throw in a little organic fertiliser and watch it grow!

If the aftercare seems a step too far, then how about living Christmas tree hire? Rudies Roots of Nettleham grow them from seed and will even deliver and collect the tree of your choice! The trees are re-used approximately 10 times before being planted so a very sustainable option.
