Stamford Shakespeare Company Behind the Scenes at Tolethorpe Hall 14 September 2022



The Activities sub committee was delighted with the response from members to this event; 91 applications were received and the team at Tolethorpe happily re- arranged the day to offer us a session in the morning and in the afternoon so that we could avoid disappointing too many people.

It was a glorious day and we enjoyed the beautiful grounds of the Hall before going inside. After the initial introductions, Michael Harrison spoke to us about the history of the building, its previous owners and

how it has evolved over the years. He has been involved with the Company for many years and has acted in the plays as well as supporting from behind the scenes. He was a mine of information.

More than 1,000 years of history make Tolethorpe Hall a very special place indeed. Owned by only four families between 1086 and 1967, its story makes fascinating reading. Toli the Dane was the first inhabitant of the site and it became known as 'Toli's Thorpe', which later became Tolethorpe. In 1086 a Norman family arrived and took the name 'de Tolethorpe' and it is believed that they built a manor house on the site of the present building. A Norman wall was uncovered during renovations.

From 1967 to 1977 the estate was neglected and in a near derelict state but then purchased/rescued by the Stamford Shakespeare Company. Then this was an amateur company founded by Jean Harley. The site was perfect for their needs as it had a natural amphitheatre in the grounds. A canvas canopy which protected the audience from inclement weather was replaced in 1993 by a permanent high-tensile canopy made from a similar material to that of the Millennium Dome. While this was being done the seating capacity was increased to 600. In 1998 an Orangery extension was built onto the Hall so that visitors could shelter there

on rainy evenings or have refreshments in the interval. However, the actors remain on the open air stage and suffer the weather, whatever is happening! The talk was accompanied by slides to show some of the renovations and extensions that have been completed in more recent years.

After a refreshment break, we were all taken on a tour backstage, showing us the paths to and from the stage for the actors to move around unseen, then to where the scenery from the last performance is stored (but will be broken down in preparation for the new season's shows). It was strange standing on the stage and looking up at all the 600 empty seats. From there we were treated to visits to the various costume rooms and had a talk from the wardrobe mistress, Miriam Spring Davies, who first joined SSC in 2013 and for the past two years has been responsible for designing and creating every costume for all productions. Miriam heads the wardrobe team, a skilled group of volunteers with a love of Tolethorpe and Theatre. Some of our group have put their names down to volunteer next season. We were also able to see the costumes from Spiders Web by Agatha Christie, the last show performed in the 2022 season. (*See left*

In the Orangery, there were mannequins dressed in some of the costumes from earlier productions. Questions were encouraged and answered throughout the tour.

Judging by the feedback, everyone had a very enjoyable time at a very special location.

Many thanks to Michael Harrison and Pippa Evered for the refreshments, the Tour and making this such a memorable visit.

Paper Flowers Workshop

pace to complete the finished stem of flowers.



I think we were all surprised at how well we did and how realistic the flowers were when we finished – although I have to admit that Sandra's was much more professional than mine. Nevertheless, I was still pleased with the result.

Those of us remaining at the end thought that you might like to see the finished results.

We had a great day, created a lovely paper flower, and discussed everything from how each WI was run to ideas for speakers. If you have ever thought about attending a workshop, I would heartily recommend you give it a go.

Speaker Report – A Potted History of Burghley House



We were treated to a potted history of Burghley House and its most reputable incumbents by **Jeannie Dykes** – a volunteer guide. There are 25 guides at Burghley and 11 or 12 are on duty each day. Burghley House was built by William Cecil, Lord High Treasurer to Queen Elizabeth I and it took 32 years to build, between 1555 and 1587.

Jeannie told us about many of the occupants of the house, including the 6th Marquis who is famous as being the winner of the famous Chariots of Fire race and was a double Olympic medallist. Victoria Leatham, the daughter of the 6th Marquis lived at Burghley for 25 years until she retired. Victoria's daughter, Miranda now lives on the ground floor of Burghley House with her husband, Orlando, and four children. Orlando is a furniture expert and is

restoring some of the furniture in the house.

Although quite a lot of the trees in the grounds of Burghley were planted by monarchs, only Queen Victoria and Prince Albert actually stayed in the house. Jeannie went on to tell us about the history of the house including its use during WW2. A fascinating talk about a fascinating building.

Keith told us about Alan Turing's invention that enabled the real breakthrough. The thing that made Enigma so hard to crack with contemporary means was that the settings changed with each keystroke. If you were to sit down at an Enigma machine right now and press the "A" key three times, you would get a different scrambled letter every time. One of the facts I found interesting was that 70 % of the people working at Bletchley Park were women,

changing lives for generations to come. A most informative evening.

On 11 October, Michelle Wright, AKA *Mrs Stylewright*, a Personal Stylist and Colour Analyst based near Grantham, was the speaker for our meeting. She has a passion for fashion and people and is all about body positivity regardless of shape or size. She loves to help a person look in the mirror and love the individual looking back at them.



Michelle offered us some great advice on how to style the clothes in our wardrobes, using similar items from her own wardrobe to demonstrate

what she was referring to. She also had some great simple style tips to help boost your confidence and make you feel great. The colour analysis was useful, as we learned which colours were best for our skin tone and gave us a new colour palette to consider and maybe work with.

Michelle was very professional, bubbly and made the whole evening great fun, giving us great tips on how to flatter our shape and how best to wear our clothes.

Phoenix Group

Wednesday 28 September saw the return of the Phoenix Group meeting for the first time since 2019. Witham St Hughs hosted, and welcomed members from Bassingham, Caythorpe, Metheringham, Navenby and Wellingore WIs. The usual meeting place of Witham St Hughs village hall was swapped for the larger and newly refurbished hall in the neighbouring village of Swinderby, and despite a few issues with the heating still being set to air conditioning, and the caretaker being in Switzerland, the space was perfect for the event.

The guest speaker was **Kirsty Ward** from My Little Allotment. Kirsty spoke bravely and emotionally about her struggles with PTSD following a traumatic birth experience with her second daughter, and the resulting post-partum psychosis. She spoke passionately about how finding gardening therapy and



the chance to have her own allotment has turned her life around and led to a range of opportunities, including designing gardens for Chelsea Flower Show, running community projects, and working with industry experts.

It really was a pleasure and privilege to listen to Kirsty talk, who despite all she has achieved still





suffers from 'imposter syndrome'. We believe her to be amongst the most inspirational women we have welcomed to a meeting and appreciated the opportunity to talk about a difficult topic that is still seen as taboo in 2022.

The buffet was a selection of food inspired by an allotment and included courgette cake, carrot cake, butternut squash quiche, potato salad, coleslaw, dips, fruit salad and a variety of other delicacies, all homemade by an enterprising team of volunteers at Witham St Hughs. Moira Hunt of Navenby WI provided a beautiful flower arrangement and Metheringham won the bursary.

We look forward to the next gathering of our group of WIs in 2023, to be hosted by Bassingham, which no doubt will be another evening of entertainment, good food and company and the chance to strengthen friendships between our WIs.

CLIMATE AMBASSADORS

Our Green and Pleasant Land – An Inter Federation Event for

Great Big Green Week - 24 September 2022

Parking at Dunholme Village Hall on Saturday, 24 September, many of us nearly ended up playing indoor bowls in the adjacent facility but fortunately were re-directed in time! After a welcome cup of tea, Liz McIntosh opened the event, the first tri-federation event for Lincs South, Lincs North and Lincs Humber, introducing the chairs of Lincs North, Dianne Tuckett and Lincs Humber, Christine Sylvester.

Our first speaker was Gerald Price from the Woodland Trust, who gave us a brief introduction to the Trust, founded in Devon in 1972 and now the largest UK woodland conservation organisation. His talk explained exactly why trees are so important and the impacts they have on human health, our resources, biodiversity and climate change.

I think we all realise, post-Covid, how important green spaces are for our mental health. We may forget that forest and orchards are also extensively managed in the UK to provide wood (including packaging and paper), charcoal, nuts and fruit. It was eye-opening to hear that trees have five different zones, providing a myriad of habitats, from birds and animals in the canopy, to lichens and insects, down to mycorrhizal fungi in the root layer. Trees also play a huge role in moderating climate by providing shade, filtering water, preventing soil erosion and, very importantly, capturing carbon. Gerald's talk was well illustrated with slides, the most shocking of which showed that the UK has only 13% tree cover, as compared with Europe (37%) and a world average of 30%! We have some work to do! Recent initiatives have been the new woods planted for the Queen's diamond and platinum Jubilees, including the Northern Forest which we could support as it borders our region. Gerald rounded off by reminding us that tree packs are still available from the Trust for communities and schools. It was a highly informative and well-paced talk.

Our next speaker was Tina Orange, one of our WI members, who teaches Horticulture at Riseholme College. Tina discussed many ideas to make our gardens more bio-diverse, such as having wildflower patches, log piles and more variety of trees, shrubs and flowers as this encourages varied species of wildlife and insects into the garden. Even weeds and nettles may be a good thing!

Tina also discussed composting techniques, how to use compost as mulch (let the earthworms do the work!) and Charles Dowding and the "no-dig" planting process. She concluded with some tips for re-using plastic bottles and punnets, and cardboard rolls.

Following this, the ladies of all Federations fed us with a lovely lunch of roast vegetable soup and then delicious fruit crumble and custard. There was also time to shop, with some enticing ethical products, bee friendly items and an amazing selection of preserves and cakes!

After lunch, we were treated to a talk on Environmental Fashion by Rebecca May, a young finalist in a recent series of Great British Sewing Bee. Rebecca had always enjoyed sewing with her mother and nana and excelled at Textiles at school.

It was a challenge to take part in the competition during Covid restrictions, but she enjoyed being immersed in the filming "bubble" in London's Canary Wharf, even sewing on "days off". Rebecca discussed the format of the programme, admitting she'd feared the transformation challenge but came to enjoy it, being particularly proud of the girl's dress she transformed from curtain material. Week Six recycle task also saw her produce a lovely waistcoat. Another highlight was her gold party dress, which earned her a first place, pipping the favourite, Serena, with whom she had a friendly rivalry!

Our ladies had many questions for Rebecca (apparently Esme is a bit scary and Patrick is lovely!). Rebecca also spoke about recycling challenges, as the fashion industry currently makes 100 billion items per year, accounting for 10% of global CO2 emissions... and 10 million tonnes of textiles then go into landfill annually! She suggested using apps for re-selling clothes (e.g., Vinted and Depop) and using factory outlets for end-of-roll designer fabrics, which might otherwise go to landfill.

Rebecca was a very confident and engaging speaker, so a very enjoyable talk and a chance to see her original fashions from her GBSB experience.

Again, we thank the organisers for arranging a very varied and interesting set of speakers and for the tasty lunch and much-appreciated teas/ coffees. We hope this is the first of many future trifederation events where we can learn from external speakers and pool our knowledge too.

If you are travelling by car please be aware that SatNav directions often direct to the next road along from Oak Park. When travelling along East Road from the direction of the A17, look out for **KWIKFIT** on the left-hand side. Turn left here on to Oak Park. WI Office is on the right-hand side.
